A further thought for Good Friday

In Mathews Gospel we find: false witnesses at Jesus' trial; people shouting 'crucify him'; the walk to Golgotha asking Simon from Cyrene to help carry the cross and finally the nailing of Jesus to the cross and death.

Crucifixion is one of the most painful ways to die - your body is dragged down and finds it hard to breath and so you gasp for air, like Covid 19 which attacks the lungs.

Yet amongst this pain Jesus cries out: 'Father forgive them they know not what they do.' He asks his disciple John to look after his mother. Even here in his dying he is thinking of others. Even here his words and actions cause a thief dying like him to believe Jesus is the Son of God and he defends Jesus to his Fellow criminal. We do not know what God looks like but what we do know is that Jesus shows us his nature and the love that is shown here in Jesus' death is amazing.

As you face a cross perhaps do the following.



Cup your hands in front of you.
Think about your problems, worries anything you fear and place them in your hands.

Say aloud or in your head
'Lord I offer my cares to you please help me.'

Then open your hands with your palms facing downwards and imagine your problems falling away.



Cup your hands in front of you again.

Say aloud or in your head
'Lord help me in all I do and say. Amen.'

The problems do not disappear as we always have to face the consequence of our actions but they now might become more manageable.
